Building for the Future

National University Student Nurses' Association (NUSNA) has taken some big steps toward our goal of being a 501(c)3 nonprofit. Russ Parkman, who is the lead faculty for National University's (NU) graduate program in taxation, agreed to formally take NUSNA as his service project for the year. Each year, members of the faculty have to perform "service" to the university as part of their faculty status; by taking NUSNA on Russ has done us a tremendous favor. His background in law (he has a

Juris Doctorate), accounting (he is a Certified Public Accountant), and taxation (he teaches those classes for a living) will ensure that as we take each step we are making decisions that protect out organization, while also building towards our future goals. Our first meeting with Russ brought forward that we needed to incorporate with the California Secretary of State as soon as possible; this process costs right shy of \$500 and take about 1 month. It is of note, that only because Russ has offered his services and talents for no

cost that our price is so low. Without his help, we would be paying well over double that price. The three Board of Directors from each campus (Fresno, Los Angeles, and San Diego) approved sending in the amount of \$150 at their respective January meetings. Following this action, we transferred the money to Russ who is now in the process of obtaining out incorporation (Inc.).

Dr. Alice Noquez

Dr. Alice Noquez is the latest addition to NU's Faculty. She joined NU July 1, 2012 as Associate Professor in the Department of Nursing and is currently the Lead Faculty for Community Health Nursing with cohort 28.

Dr. Noquez received her MSN from the University of San Diego in 1997 and PhD in Nursing from the University of San Diego in 2008. Before coming to NU. she worked at California State University Long Beach (CSULB) where she spent three years as a Coordinator of the MSH Family Nurse Practitioner Program. She taught at the graduate level, both core courses and content specific to the Family Nurse Practitioner track. Prior to CSULB, Dr. Noquez spent a year at the University of Nevada Las Vegas as a Visiting Professor teaching Community Health at the undergraduate level. She is a Board Certified Family Nurse Practitioner and maintains a clinical practice one day a week.

Why did you choose to teach at NU?

I chose to work at NU in a full time capacity because I had experience teaching Nursing Theory as adjunct faculty at the Los Angeles campus for two years and I enjoyed the accelerated curriculum format and teaching in a hybrid model. As a private university, National attracts a unique caliber of students who are highly motivated and high achievers. In my experience, the possess maturity and bring extensive life and career capabilities to their nursing education. The innate dive for learning among NU nursing students is a good fit with my philosophy of a teacher as a facilitator of learning who promotes autonomy.

Is there any advice you can give to nursing students to help them become successful in National University's nursing program? Student success in National University's nursing program requires well developed time management skills to meet the demands of the accelerated curriculum. Communication and networking are essential. With the renewed focus among leadership and faculty to make each student's experience a positive one, I encourage students to communicate with faculty regarding their learning needs and challenges. Membership in the Student Nurses Association (NUSNA) is an excellent way to network and the mentoring program they provide has been a great success. Finally, remember to take care of yourself. Get enough rest, eat well and when you can, play a little. Your journey through this nursing education is a special time in your life so embrace every experience as you make progress towards a rewarding career in nursing. •

Licensed Vocational Nurse By: Jessica Roman (LVN Cohort 5)

Licensed Vocational Nurses (LVNs) are entry-level health care professionals who work under Registered Nurses and Physicians. Most LVNs have attended 12-18 months of formal training in a California "approved" vocational nursing program or have challenged the NCLEX-PN based on work experiences, such as military Corpsman. Upon completion of their training, they then sit for the NCLEX-PN exam to receive a California Vocational Nursing License.

LVNs have the opportunity to earn a Baccalaureate nursing degree through NU's unique program. The LVN to BSN

step-up program consists of 15 months of core not limit myself to the entry-level health care nursing classes and accepts 20 students annually. Because of their educational background, LVNs do not take the same path as generic entry baccalaureate nursing students; they are not required to complete Fundamentals, Medical-Surgical I, Pediatrics nr NR.

Classmate, Grace Siu who has been a LVN for 3 years, chose to go back to school because of more career options. "I could specialize in a certain area and travel if I wanted to".

I am simply following my career path. When I initially became a nurse in 2011 I knew I would

role that LVNs serve. I wanted the educational background and the knowledge to complete safe and effective health care for my patients. As LVNs we are taught to perform tasks (i.e. trach care, inserting NG tubes, foley care) but are not taught to be analytical in what we are doing. We do not challenge our minds and ask why or request explanation; we simply follow orders. At the baccalaureate level, nurses are so diligent in providing the highest level of care but in addition to that they have an educational background and the critical thinking skills that set them apart from LVNs.



Cohort Updates

Cohort 27 is currently in Leadership with Dr. Guertin. Clinicals are being held at Scripps Memorial in La Jolla. The students are getting a firsthand look at what it means to be a nurse manager. They are also working very hard at reviewing ATI in order to study for the comprehensive predictor exam. This exam is 180 questions and is three hours long. It's comprehensive, so it will cover everything from Fundamentals through Leadership. The Cohort is getting excited to be finishing this challenging program and begin to study for the NCLEX.

Cohort 28 is currently in Community with Dr. Noquez and loving the opportunities to work with people in the real world setting! The course is focused on developing a resource for a community within San Diego to improve public health conditions. As cohort 28 continues on through the community classes, the nearby light of graduation is a bright reminder of how far they have come!

Cohort 29 recently finished up their Peds rotation with Professor Maureen Evans and is beginning eight weeks of Psychiatric Nursing with Professor Ann Kelly. They are excited by the challenge of learning about therapeutic communication and working with a completely new patient population. Four clinical groups are split between Scripps Mercy, Sharp Mesa Vista, Sharp Grossmont and the VA.

Cohort 30 is currently in OB/Maternal Newborn Nursing with Professor Debra Casey. This is an exciting and challenging class. Some students incorporate their knowledge from personal experience to clinical practice while others are able to learn for the first time about maternal and newborn nursing. Students have clinical rotations at Sharp Chula Vista, Scripps Mercy Chula Vista, Scripps Mercy San Diego, and Scripps Memorial La Jolla. Cohort 30 is excited to have completed about half of the nursing program and is looking forward to another year to come!

Cohort 31 is currently in Medical Surgical II with Professor Sangsanoi. The class of 49 faces each day trying to absorb a vast load of material and trying to learn to think critically about how to care for patients in pressing circumstances. Clinicals are exciting, with hands-on experiences with diverse people who have medical surgical related diagnoses, and Cohort 31 attends clinicals at Scripps Mercy, Kaiser Hospital, and Sharp Chula Vista. Overall, Med Surg II is a tough but welcome challenge for Cohort 31!

Cohort 32 just finished up Fundamentals and enjoyed their clinical time at the SNF's learning and honing new skills. They are currently taking on the challenge of Med Surg. The cohort is now 56 students, each of whom is eager to continue learning, thriving and surviving this part of the journey. They have been contacting their mentors from the new mentorship program each step of the way for advice and guidance.

Cohort 33 is currently in Pharmacology with Professor Parent. New friendships and bonds continue to form as we go through the program together (see pictures below). We look forward to the challenges that lie ahead.





LVN Cohort 5, made up of 20 Licensed Vocational Nurses, has just completed their first class, Professional Nursing Values with Dr. Kracun. This class was designed specifically for LVNs to gain greater understanding of the scope of practice between the LVN and RN roles. The LVN Cohort 5 also completed their ATI focused reviews on Caring for Children and Maternal-Newborn as they are not required to complete these classes. They are currently in Nursing Theory, a hybrid class, with Dr. Dahlen. The LVN cohort 5 students are very eager to become the first LVN cohort involved with the NUSNA. Their cohort representatives are Allison Corbett and Jessica Roman.


